



## ART CAREER RESEARCH PROJECT

The notion of the “starving artist” is a myth! There are plenty of career opportunities available to you in the arts, and you should be aware of what they are. Many students take courses in the arts to begin building an art portfolio to prepare them for a possible career in the arts while others may just want to see if they have a particular passion for creating art. Regardless of what your career plans are at this juncture, it is important for students of art to realize that anyone can have a successful, financially-stable career in an art-related field.

### PROJECT OBJECTIVE

You will research career opportunities in the visual arts that interest you, determine if any suit your interests and abilities, and consider options at the collegiate level that would prepare you for those careers. Make sure to research “visual arts” careers only! The work of a visual artist can incorporate a variety of different disciplines, including drawing, painting, sculpture, textile design, graphic design, photography, and film, among other areas. Any career that has an aesthetic, creative component will likely fall under the umbrella of “visual arts” careers. You will compile your entire research into a slideshow presentation.

### DIRECTIONS

#### 1. Research 3 different art-related careers

You may be surprised to see certain careers listed on these sites. This is because careers like “architect” aren’t considered by many to be “visual arts” careers, but they require specific arts knowledge, such as drawing or linear perspective, and may also require a creative arts portfolio for post-secondary admissions. You may also choose to research careers that appear similar to one another (for example, “fashion designer” and “fashion merchandizer”), but if the careers seem almost identical after doing some research, you should change one of your career topics to something different. You may also research careers that you can’t find on these websites as long as there is a clear connection to the visual arts.





## 2. Slideshow Design Format

Choose a design format for your presentation and arrange your information effectively. You may use Microsoft PowerPoint, Google Slides, Open Office Impress, etc. to create your presentation. You may not use Prezi, or similar formats. There are plenty of options for slide layouts under the “Design” tab, or when you create a new presentation. You may use the same layout for all 3 art careers, or change layouts between each career to suit that specific career. Consider these tips:

- Don't overlap text on an image if it's too difficult to read (usually the case). Use a more solid background and choose a contrasting colour.
- Include at least one relevant image per slide so they aren't too text-heavy (except title slide).
- Consider the composition of every slide. Arrange the space in an appealing, easy-to-navigate way.
- You may use animations, but it is not a requirement.
- Sometimes, simplicity is best!
- If you want to create your own theme for your background, follow the instructions on the attached handout (Appendix 2).

## 3. Proofread your presentation!

- Check for spelling, grammar, and syntax (worth 5pts overall)
- You are strongly encouraged to use bullet points instead of complete sentences.
- You don't have to use any citations, and you do not have to include a reference slide.

## 4. Organization

- Organize your presentation based on the criteria in the chart included in this document (Appendix 1).
- For each of your 3 careers, you must follow this slide structure. You are, in essence, creating 3 mini slide presentations.
- You may create more than one slide for each section of the content area if you have enough information to do so. However, do not combine content sections into 1 slide!

## 5. Submission

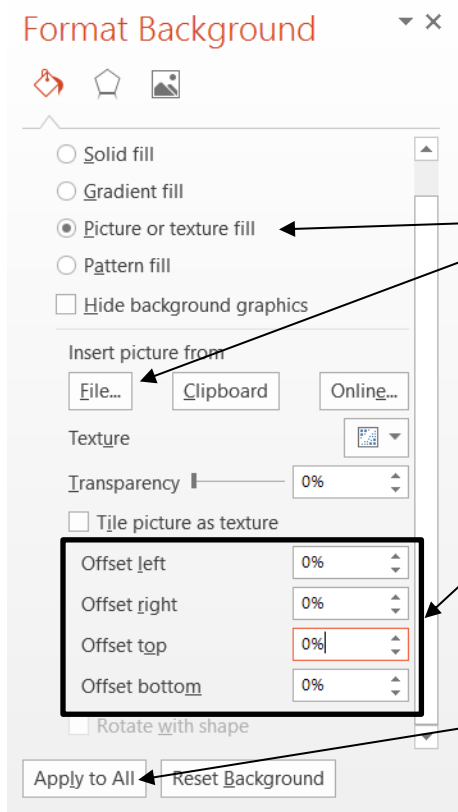


### APPENDIX 2: Tutorial - Creating a custom slide background in PowerPoint

1. Google “PowerPoint background” and find one you like. The best backgrounds are mostly solid-color in the middle with some kind of border, or just an overall textural component. Examples:



2. Save the image file to your network folder.
3. Open a new presentation in PowerPoint. Right-click on the first slide, and select “Format Background” from the dropdown menu.
4. Then, follow these instructions:

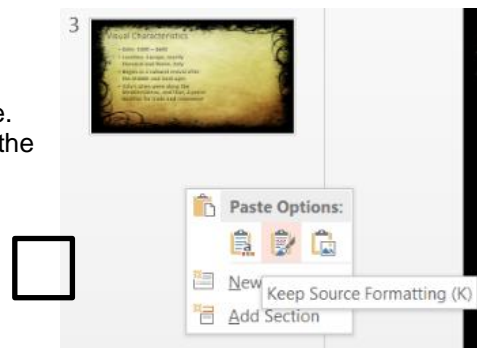


Select the “Picture or Texture Fill” option, then click File to insert your image. Navigate to the correct file in your network and click Insert.

If the image doesn’t fit perfectly or the borders are cut off, set all of these numbers to zero percent. Keep in mind this may warp the image if the subject matter is recognizable, so you may not want to do this.

To apply this same background to all other slides in your PowerPoint, select Apply All

5. If you want a different background design for each of your mini presentations, make 3 different PowerPoints. Make 1 of those 3 presentations your main file. One presentation at a time, select all slides, right click, select copy. Then, in the slide view area of the main presentation, right click, and select “Keep Source Formatting” in the Paste Options menu.
