The Chaplain's Corner

A Meditation for a Holy Season

Do you ever feel like you've fallen to the ground, hurt from a lost relationship, or from the death of someone you love? Or perhaps you've been humiliated, feeling like your face is in the dirt? There are many situations in life that can leave us feeling like our face is in the dirt, but as Christians this

Jesus also fell to the ground as he carried his cross—his face was in the dirt, Lord knows. But Jesus transforms everything and makes all things new; even the most humiliating and hurtful times can be moments of transformation and healing. Take this of the blind man:

shouldn't—let's rephrase—this mustn't cause us to despair.

As he went along, he saw a man blind from birth. His disciples asked him, "Rabbi, who sinned, this man or his parents, that he was born blind?"

"Neither this man nor his parents sinned," said Jesus, "but this happened so that the works of God might be displayed in him. As long as it is day, we must do the works of him who sent me. Night is coming, when no one can work. While I am in the world, I am the light of the world."

After saying this, he spit on the ground, made some mud with the saliva, and put it on the man's eyes. "Go," he told him, "wash in the Pool of Siloam" (this word means "Sent"). So the man went and washed, and came home seeing.

[Then the people asked him,] "How then were your eyes opened?"

He replied, "The man they call Jesus made some mud and put it on my eyes. He told me to go to Siloam and wash. So I went and washed, and then I could see."

This blind man was being humiliated in front of Jesus—his defects were on display. But what does Jesus do? He takes the situation and transforms it: "this happened so that the works of God might be displayed in him." Wow—talk about turning their thinking upside down—a different tone than the focus on "sin" that the disciples first had...

And so it is with us. Our defects, our shortcomings, our failed relationships, our sorrows and our humiliations—these are all encapsulated in the story of the blind man. Perhaps we need to be reminded of those powerful words: "this happened so that the works of God might be displayed in us."

These are words to meditate on—words to change us; words to transform us. When we feel like our face is in the dirt, may we never forget that God uses dirt to bring about healing.

- Which adult outside of our family would you like to get to know better? Why?
- If you had a tough question that you didn't want to discuss with me (us), who would you go to?
- How can we show our appreciation to the significant adults in your life?

Caring Adults

Young people who have other caring adults to talk with are:

- Less likely to do risky things, such as use alcohol or other drugs
- More likely to grow up successfully
