New Initiatives:

- **reAction4inclusion** the youth leadership wing of Community Living Ontario has set up a new website called *"Track the Movement"*. The online update will share stories, articles and profile young leaders to promote informed and connected youth across the province.

Children's Mental Health Ontario – Deena Shorkey

Children's Mental Health Ontario have been training in CBT, trauma, play therapy and grief. Their main focus is to build a mental health pathway and work with cross sectors to try to target at risk moms with newborns. They received a grant for the infant mental health project. Community response has been positive on messaging around social media and its impact on children's mental health.

Open Doors for Lanark Children and Youth – Karen Moore

Open Doors now has walk-in clinics for children and families. Parents can access information about mental health issues for their children. Staff are participating in trauma-informed CBT training and DDP training. They are increasing supports for trauma, addictions and mental health.

IV. Department Update

The Special Education Department had the opportunity to lead principals through their school EQAO data that focused on reading, writing and math. Principals compared the data for students with IEPs and for students without IEPs. Through this analysis, principals determined the strengths and needs of their schools in all three areas. This exercise provided them with the information needed to go back to their schools to plan next steps with their school teams and will help to inform the SIPSA.

The PA Day for Educational Assistants will be held on January 31st, 2019 via Skype. Members of the Special Education Team will be sharing ideas and strategies to support our special needs learners. Ideas will be shared around creating visual supports, sensory supports, speech language activities and assistive technology applications. After the morning session, Educational Assistants will have the opportunity to create materials to support the students they work with. They will be able to share their ideas with each other by posting the information on Office 365.

V. <u>*Presentation*</u>: Multi-disciplinary Approach to Assessment

The vision of the Multi-disciplinary Team is to look at students with complex multidimensional needs who are struggling. To look at these elements, all the team members are brought to the table to problem solve and come up with an individualized plan for the student. The team members include; Janet Carioni, Occupational Therapist, Sandra O'Doherty, ABA Expertise Professional, Leslie-Ann McLeod, ABA Expertise Professional and Tiffany Ashford, Speech Language Pathologist.

The privacy statement and referral process was shared with SEAC members. It was explained that once the student has been referred by the principal or a consultant in the Special Education Department, the multi-disciplinary team members gather information, go into the school to observe, assess, and discuss what they have seen through the lens of their different disciplines. The support is dynamic and includes trialing strategies, modelling, adapting and adjusting goals and strategies as the needs of the students and school change.

A case study was shared highlighting the presenting needs of a child and the clinical observations from the multi-disciplinary team. The recommendations for the student included a sample of a visual schedule and a communication system. This student is now using the system to express choices. A First, ... Then board and sensory activities were also introduced to support the student. The team will continue to revisit the programming and support school staff to implement it as the students' needs evolve.

The philosophy for this approach to special education is summed up nicely in the following quote: "When a flower doesn't bloom you fix the environment in which it grows, not the flower".
